PROTECTED DISCLOSURES ACT 2014, as amended 2023 Annual Report

About the Health Information and Quality Authority

The Health Information and Quality Authority (HIQA) is an independent statutory body established to promote safety and quality in the provision of health and social care services for the benefit of the health and welfare of the public.

Reporting to the Minister for Health and engaging with the Minister for Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth, HIQA has responsibility for the following:

- Setting standards for health and social care services Developing person-centred standards and guidance, based on evidence and international best practice, for health and social care services in Ireland.
- **Regulating social care services** The Chief Inspector of Social Services within HIQA is responsible for registering and inspecting residential services for older people and people with a disability, and children's special care units.
- Regulating health services Regulating medical exposure to ionising radiation.
- Monitoring services Monitoring the safety and quality of permanent international protection accommodation service centres, health services and children's social services against the national standards. Where necessary, HIQA investigates serious concerns about the health and welfare of people who use health services and children's social services.
- Health technology assessment Evaluating the clinical and cost
 effectiveness of health programmes, policies, medicines, medical equipment,
 diagnostic and surgical techniques, health promotion and protection activities,
 and providing advice to enable the best use of resources and the best
 outcomes for people who use our health service.
- Health information Advising on the efficient and secure collection and sharing of health information, setting standards, evaluating information resources and publishing information on the delivery and performance of Ireland's health and social care services.
- **National Care Experience Programme** Carrying out national serviceuser experience surveys across a range of health and social care services, with the Department of Health and the HSE.

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Introduction

Under section 22 (5) of the Protected Disclosures Act 2014, as amended, each public body is required to publish an annual report outlining the number of protected disclosures received in the previous year and the action taken (if any). This report must not result in the identification of persons making a protected disclosure. This report covers the period of 1 January to 31 December 2023.

Internal channel

In line with the Protected Disclosures Act 2014, as amended, the Health Information and Quality Authority (HIQA) has an internal reporting channel and procedure for workers to make a protected disclosure. No protected disclosures were received internally in 2023 (see schedule 1).

External channel

Under Section 7(2) of the Act, the Minister for Public Expenditure, National Development Plan Delivery and Reform has prescribed HIQA's Chief Executive Officer (CEO) as an appropriate recipient of disclosures. These reports of relevant wrongdoings relate to all matters concerning the standards of safety and care of persons receiving health and social care services in the public and voluntary settings, as well as private social care services, as provided for by the Health Act 2007. Any such disclosures made can only be dealt with in a way that is consistent with, and appropriate to the role, statutory rights and duties of HIQA.

In line with the requirements of the Act, HIQA has an external reporting channel and procedure for workers to make a report of a relevant wrongdoing to the CEO of HIQA, as a prescribed person. For more information, see our webpage on making a protected disclosure to the CEO as a prescribed person under the Protected Disclosures Act 2014 (as amended).

As reported in 2022, 81 disclosures were received under section 7 of the Act, of which 77 matters were closed by year end. Four progressed into 2023, with one of these remaining under regulatory review.

In preparation for the commencement of the Protected Disclosures (Amendment) Act 2022 on 1 January 2023, HIQA reviewed its procedures and deemed that all

employees contacting HIQA about services and centres under its regulatory remit would be treated as potential protected disclosures from 1 January 2023.

In 2023, 373 reports received were assessed under the Protected Disclosures Act 2014, as amended. Twenty nine (29) were deemed not to be a protected disclosure and were either closed or followed up under a different relevant procedure. A further seven were closed as the report was repetitive and contained no meaningful new information.

Thirty one (31) were transmitted to another prescribed person or the Office of the Protected Disclosures Commissioner in line with section 7A (1) (b) (vi) (1) (A) and (B) of the Act as the report contained matters that were not within the scope of HIQA.

In the case of a further 285, this information was logged and risk-assessed and in each case used to inform the most appropriate intervention by HIQA as a regulator of health and social care services and in compliance with its duties under the Protected Disclosures Act 2014. Fifty four (54) were closed because the report was clearly minor and 231 warranted further follow-up, of which five remain under regulatory review at year end.

The remaining 21 reports remained under assessment at year end.

Penalisation

The commencement of the Protected Disclosures (Amendment) Act 2022 at the beginning of 2023 also brought about important changes to the protections provided to persons who make protected disclosures and the legal framework for those seeking remedies following penalisation.

While the Act imposes an obligation on the CEO of HIQA as a prescribed person to protect the identity of the reporting person, with the exception of certain provisions within the Act, both public and private bodies should be aware of their responsibilities as employers to protect workers from potential penalisation. Employers are obliged to address complaints of penalisation made by reporting

persons. Employers are also obliged to not cause or permit any other person to penalise or threaten penalisation against a reporting person.

Any claim of penalisation in the Workplace Relations Commission, or Circuit Court injunction proceedings regarding penalisation, will be brought against the employer rather than the individual employees responsible. The burden of proof is on the employer to prove that the act or omission was justified on other grounds.

It is therefore imperative that employers should take steps to reduce any risk of a reporting person's identity becoming known, should they become aware that a protected disclose has been made about their service. They should also ensure they have an appropriate policy and procedures in place to deal with claims of penalisation and provide training and awareness on protected disclosures and Procedures to all employees.

This may require a culture change in how protected disclosures are perceived within organisations and a move away from informal inquiries as to the identity of the worker and the associated negative connotations. Protected disclosures via both internal and external channels can contribute to service improvement and can be a vital system in identifying wrongdoing or poor practices.


